

Lawyer to pay \$4.5M to gay U-M student

DETROIT (AP) — A jury on Thursday awarded a gay University of Michigan student body president \$4.5 million in his lawsuit against a former Michigan assistant attorney general who posted about him in an anti-gay blog.

The U.S. District Court jury ruled in favor of Christopher Armstrong, who claimed he suffered distress after a blog created by Andrew Shirvell accused him of enticing minors with alcohol and recruiting people to become homosexual.

"I'm just incredibly humbled by what happened today," Armstrong told The Associated Press. "This is truly a victory — not just for myself, but for a lot of other kids out there."

Shirvell, who was representing himself, said the jury award was "grossly excessive" for what was "clearly protected speech ... and activity."

"This should have been thrown out," he said, adding that he plans to appeal. "Juries give short shrift to First Amendment rights."

Armstrong accused Shirvell of defamation as well as emotional distress for his actions on the blog, in Facebook posts and during visits to the Ann Arbor campus.

Then-Attorney General Mike Cox fired Shirvell in 2010 after he criticized Armstrong, who graduated last year.

Shirvell has said he viewed his blog "as a movement to get" Armstrong to resign. Shirvell argued he was acting within his First Amendment rights.



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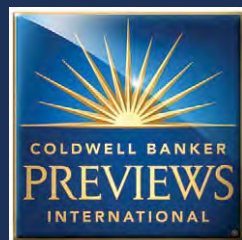

Hospital mergers, affiliations: our new reality

This spring, we had a glimpse of what happens when a community loses its hospital.

Cheboygan Memorial Hospital filed for bankruptcy in March after losing more than \$7 million in 2011. In April, a last minute deal for the hospital to be sold to McLaren Health Care fell through because of some paperwork issues, and the next day, the hospital closed its doors. The closure left those living in Cheboygan no hospital, no nearby place to go in an emergency and forced patients to find alternative care. More than 400 employees were left without a job.

Slimmed down services at the hospital eventually resumed, about six weeks later.

While a deal with the hospital and McLaren was eventually reached and many services at the former Cheboygan hospital have resumed, those events only shined a light on what so many small communities are dealing with — financially strapped health care systems and small hospitals that are losing money in a broken health care model. It has left many of these small

systems and hospitals in search of a larger partner to hold hands with, willing to give up some of the reins of power if it means a way to stay open.

Our two local hospitals — Charlevoix Area Hospital and the former Northern Michigan Regional Hospital — were seemingly in the same boat. Both had their own problems, and were essentially, losing money and looking for a life raft.

In 2011, the former Northern Michigan Regional Hospital was slammed with \$8.3 million in bad debt and \$4.7 million in charity care. Essentially, this translates to \$13 million in losses for the hospital because people can't, or just refuse to pay their bill. The year prior, the number was even higher at about \$16 million.

This isn't just a financial hit for the hospital. Employees endured rounds of layoffs and patients saw services cut — Lockwood MacDonald closed in 2010, along with the Benjamin B. Blum Hospitality House and the hospital's special care nursery.

The financial strain became apparent.

But while all this was hap-

pening, hospital leaders had been looking ahead and knew a change was needed. The hospital's board of trustees began exploring the idea of aligning with a larger health system. The move gives smaller hospitals, such as Northern Michigan Regional Hospital, the ability to take advantage of more capital, purchasing powers and, essentially, gives the smaller guy a safety net.

And after two years of talks with various health systems, in January, Northern Michigan Regional Hospital agreed to become part of Flint-based McLaren Health Care, the same system which eventually took the reins at the now defunct Cheboygan Memorial Hospital.

We admit, we had concerns.

What would happen to our local hospital? Would we lose even more services? Would our friends and neighbors lose their jobs?

Now, seven months later, while some questions remain, we can't help but feel more confident about the hospital's future. We'd be fools to think our hospital could dig out of the hole alone.

In June, McLaren president and CEO, Philip Incarnati, visited Petoskey and spoke with the News-Review. He noted that financial help aside, McLaren saw plenty of positives in the former Northern Michigan Regional Hospital, now known as McLaren Northern Michigan.

"On the clinical side, the hospital here was already regarded as having good clinical care. We really didn't see any issues in regards to clinical quality," Incarnati said. "This is a good hospital and provides good care and to me that is comforting."

And that should be comforting for us as a community to hear as well.

Just last month, Charlevoix Area Hospital followed suit when it signed a regional affiliation agreement with Munson Healthcare based in Traverse City. The agreement gives the Charlevoix hospital access to a broad range of services, such as with information systems and group purchasing.

Charlevoix Area Hospital CEO, Lyn Jenks, said at this point, the agreement will really help the hospital with more of the busi-

ness side of things, with patients not seeing much, if any, change in service.

But in the long run, we can't help but think that if a hospital can get a helping hand on the business side, if that gives it a boost financially, it only helps us as a community and as patients because we need our community hospitals.

There comes a time when changes need to be made and sometimes that means reaching out for a helping hand. Because what happened in Cheboygan could happen anywhere. Down the road, it could have very well have happened here.

Hospital affiliations and mergers may be our new reality. And if that means we get to keep our great doctors, the top-notch services we've come to know and keeps our local hospital doors open, that new reality might just be OK.

Or to calm a crying child while hundreds of eyes stare. Or patiently try to explain why we must wait our turn to go on the merry-go-round.

I did witness one thing, however, that I did not, would not tolerate with my kids.

I was saving a spot at a picnic table while my friend stood in line to buy drinks. Behind my friend were a few more adults and two little boys — around 8 years old. The bigger boy glared at the smaller one and pushed him, a mean glint in his eye. I stared.

The bully glanced in my direction and hesitated before giving the boy another shove. The boy stumbled back, narrowly missing an innocent bystander. Keeping my eyes locked on their activity, I turned my body toward the fray. They froze for a moment. Then, defiantly, his eyes cast my way, he plowed against the boy a third time.

The smaller boy tried to act cool, while I started to lose mine.

The words begin to form in my mouth. I was about to say, "You're going to knock someone over," or "That's not very nice," or even "Which one of these women is your mother?" But I

didn't have to. Someone else was watching. A preteen girl called to the mother by name. The mother turned. She gave her boy the evil eye. The boy stopped. The mother turned away. The boy sneered at her back. And gave his victim one last push.

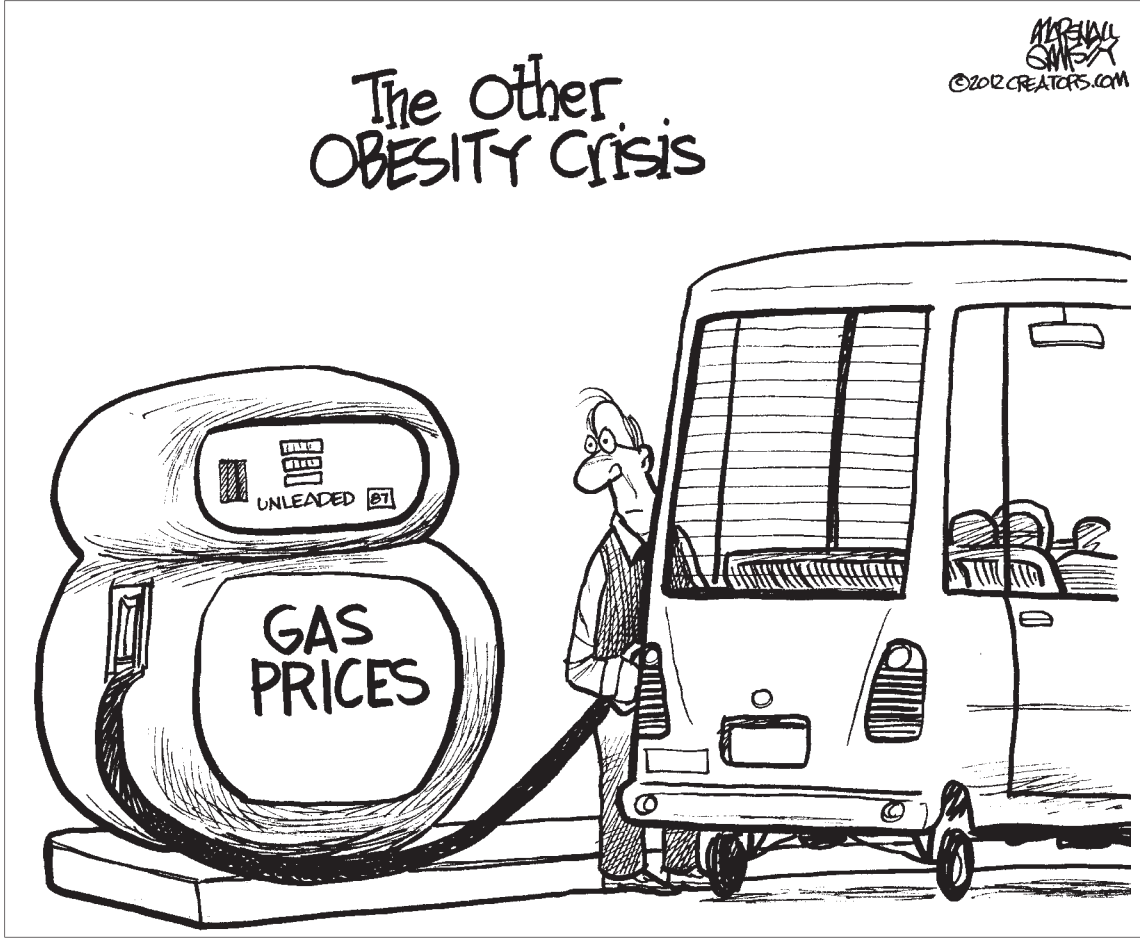
The family ended up sitting next to our table. We couldn't help but overhear as the boy rudely demanded a drink, and when his father ignored him, tore the cup from his hand. My friend said she was about to say something to the boy, too. And as we sat there shaking our heads, she also said that sometimes parents get used to behavior like that, and they don't realize how offensive it becomes to us, "The Village."

How much of a responsibility do we have to correct behavior like this? Should we speak up? Or cast a warning look? I know fear stopped me from saying something in this case. I was afraid the parent would tell me to mind my own business. Or that I would just make the situation worse. Aside from the glares I gave the kid, I felt like minding my own business was the safest way to go.

I just know when they finally left, a kind of peace settled over "The Village."

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Mitt Romney's present, Paul Ryan's future

WASHINGTON — Vice presidential picks are always judged by their effect on the coming election. They rarely have any.

This time could be different. The Democrats' Mediscare barrage is already in full swing. Paul Ryan, it seems, is determined to dispossess grandma, then toss her over a cliff. If the charge is not successfully countered, goodbye Florida.

Republicans have a twofold answer. First, hammer home that their plan affects no one over 55, let alone 65. Second, go on offense. Point out that President Obama cuts Medicare by \$700 billion to finance Obamacare.

It's a sweet judo throw: Want to bring up Medicare, supposedly our weakness? Fine. But now you've got to debate Obamacare, your weakness—and explain why you are robbing granny's health care to pay for your pet project.

If Romney/Ryan can successfully counterattack Mediscare, the Ryan effect becomes a major plus. Because:

(a) Ryan nationalizes the election and makes it ideological, reprising the 2010 dynamic that delivered a “shellacking” to the Democrats.

(b) If the conversation is about big issues, Obama cannot hide from his dismal economic record and complete failure of vision. In Obama's own on-camera commercial — “the choice ... couldn't be bigger” — what's his big idea? A 4.6 point increase in the marginal tax rate of 2 percent of the population.

That's it? That's his program? For a country with stagnant growth, ruinous debt and structural problems crying out for major entitlement and tax reform? Obama's “plan” would cut the deficit from \$1.20 trillion

to \$1.12 trillion. It's a joke.

(c) Image. Ryan, fresh and 42, brings youth, energy and vitality — the very qualities Obama projected in 2008 and has by now depleted. “Hope and change” has become “the other guy killed a steelworker's wife.” From transcendence to the political gutter in under four years. A new Olympic record.

While Ryan's effect on 2012 is as yet undetermined — it depends on the success or failure of Mediscare — there is less doubt about the meaning of Ryan's selection for beyond 2012. He could well become the face of Republicanism for a generation.

There's a history here. By choosing George H.W. Bush in 1980, Ronald Reagan gave birth to a father-son dynasty that dominated the presidential scene for three decades. The Bush name was on six of seven consecutive national tickets.

When Dwight Eisenhower picked Richard Nixon in 1952, he turned a relatively obscure senator into a dominant national figure for a quarter-century, appearing on the presidential ticket in five of six consecutive elections.

Even losing VP candidates can ascend to party leader and presumptive presidential nominee. Ed Muskie so emerged in 1968, until he melted down in New Hampshire in 1972. Walter Mondale so emerged in 1980 and won the presidential nomination four years later. (The general election was another story.) Winning is even better. Forty percent of

20th-century presidents were former VPs: Theodore Roosevelt, Coolidge, Truman, Johnson, Nixon, Ford and Bush (41).

Before Aug. 11, Ryan already was the party's intellectual leader and de facto parliamentary leader — youngest-ever House Budget Committee chairman whose fiscal blueprint has driven congressional debate for two years. Now, however, he is second only to Romney as the party's undisputed political leader.

And while Romney is the present, Ryan is the future. Romney's fate will be determined on Nov. 6. Ryan's presence, assuming he acquits himself well in the campaign, will extend for decades.

Ryan's importance is enhanced by his identity as a movement conservative. Reagan was the first movement leader in modern times to achieve the presidency. Like him, Ryan represents a new kind of conservatism for his time.

Reagan rejected the moderate accommodationism represented by Gerald Ford, the sitting president Reagan

nearly overthrew in 1976. Ryan represents a new constitutional conservatism of limited government and individual opportunity that carried Republicans to victory in 2010, not just as a rejection of Obama's big-government hyper-liberalism but also as a significant departure from the philosophically undisciplined, idiosyncratically free-spending “compassionate conservatism” of Obama's Republican predecessor.

Ryan's role is to make the case for a serious approach to structural problems — a hardheaded, sober-hearted conservatism that puts to shame a reactionary liberalism that, with Greece in our future, offers handouts, bromides and a 4.6 percent increase in tax rates.

If Ryan does it well, win or lose in 2012, he becomes a dominant national force. Mild and moderate Mitt Romney will have shaped the conservative future for years to come.

The cunning of history. Or if you prefer, sheer capriciousness.

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Online crime map system launched

In an effort to increase transparency and encourage area residents who have information on crimes to submit anonymous tips, the Petoskey Department of Public Safety has adopted an on-line crime mapping system called Crimedar.

Members of the public may go to www.crimedar.com/petoskey-michigan to find crime logs and maps detailing incidents the department responded to by date.

Incidents are categorized, such as assault, home invasion, animal control, armed robbery, auto accident, fire response, operating while intoxicated, ambulance response and fraud.

Lt. Randall Weston, who was tasked with getting the system up and running for the department, said a few finishing touches are still needed, but the maps and logs are functional now.

“This is only going to get better because it’s in its infancy as we’re working some of the bugs out,” he said.

Weston said incidents will remain on the map for two weeks, but he plans to keep that data in the log for a year. He said the site will be updated every two to three days. “This provides a wealth of information now and it’s going to get a lot better as we go along,” Weston said.

Adding, “I think it’s a great thing. This provides transparency to the community.”

Incidents detailed on the site will include the time, date and location, a brief

description and the report number.

Weston said some incidents will be excluded from the map, such as criminal sexual conduct complaints, drug arrests, drug investigation information and juvenile complaints.

“There are certain things that we’re not going to put out in mapping, one of those would be a domestic assault. Because this maps the actual crime it would show the address and, for obvious reasons, that’s not an appropriate thing for us to map,” he said.

Weston said the public safety department is the first law enforcement agency in the area to use this program. He hopes this tool will encourage more people who have information on crime to provide tips to the department.

Public safety director John Calabrese said that has been the experience of some of the other agencies using it.

“They’re actually getting good crime tip information from people that are going on there, looking at it and saying, ‘Hey I know something about that.’ And they’re calling the department.”

Swine flu reported in Michigan

The first Michigan case of variant H3N2 influenza has been identified, according to the Michigan Department of Community Health.

The victim is a child from Washtenaw County who was exposed to the swine at the Ingham County Fair on Aug. 1. The child had a mild illness and was not hospitalized. Preliminary test results indicate the presence of the H3N2 virus, and the specimen will be sent to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for confirmatory tests.

According to the CDC, 145 cases of the H3N2 virus had been reported as of last week, with most of them — 113 cases — occurring in Indiana. Thirty were reported in Ohio, one in Illinois and one in Hawaii. Most of those afflicted are children under 18 years of age, and

most cases have been mild.

The CDC has also stated that, although the outbreaks will continue to be monitored closely, they do not constitute a pandemic.

Direct exposure to infected pigs has been the primary cause, and there is no clear evidence of sustained human-to-human spread of the virus.

With the arrival of Northern Michigan’s county fair season, Joshua Meyerson, medical director for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, offers some special precautions for those attending the fair, and anyone else who may be exposed to pigs or areas where swine are kept, such as livestock barns.

“High-risk people — that is, people with underlying lung, heart or immune system prob-

lems — should avoid contact with pigs, and the barns where they are held,” Meyerson cautioned.

“Everyone should avoid eating or drinking while in these facilities, and never take children’s ‘sippy cups’ into the barns. Hand-washing stations or hand sanitizers should be available, and should be used.”

The CDC also recommends avoiding close contact with swine, particularly those that appear or act ill. Individuals who develop flu-like symptoms should follow normal precautions, seek medical treatment and follow physician recommendations.

Any recent exposures to swine or livestock facilities should be reported to the physician at the time of treatment, for possible follow-up investigation.

Court: Deduction for health care ruled unconstitutional

LANSING (AP) — The Michigan Court of Appeals has ruled unconstitutional a state law forcing school employees to pay 3 percent of their salary toward retiree health care.

A copy of Thursday’s 2-1 ruling was released today, Friday. The contribution

was put into place in 2010, and unions representing teachers filed suit. In 2011, retired Ingham County Circuit Judge James Giddings, who was hearing the case before he stepped down and returned to finish the job, ruled that school employees were

paying into a system that may not ultimately benefit them.

The contribution was instituted as part of an effort to save hundreds of millions of dollars for the state. MLive.com reports some unions want the money to be refunded.

Apples get early start

SUTTONS BAY (AP) — Apple-picking, a cherished autumn tradition, is off to an early start in the Northeast and Upper Midwest as growers deal with after-shocks from wacky spring weather that hammered fruit crops.

A series of below-freezing nights in April zapped buds that had sprouted during a rare summerlike stretch the previous month, decimating cherries, peaches and other tree fruits. While some apple orchards escaped relatively unscathed, many are producing only a small fraction of their normal output and some are coming up empty.

Michigan was hit especially hard. A harvest of perhaps 3 million bushels is expected, down from

the usual 23 million or so, said executive director Diane Smith of the Michigan Apple Committee. The prolonged drought hasn’t helped matters but isn’t a leading cause of the drop-off, because apple trees have deep roots well-suited to reaching groundwater, she said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture says the nationwide yield will be about 14 percent below last year’s and the smallest since 1986. A slight uptick in Washington, the top apple producer, and other Western states will help grocers compensate for the decline east of the Mississippi.

Across the Great Lakes region, which includes four of the nation’s top 10 apple-growing states —

New York, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Ohio — fruit that survived is ripening weeks earlier than usual. It’s happening in parts of New England as well. For people who enjoy visiting orchards to pick apples or stopping by a farm market to buy a bushel and a jug of cider on a crisp fall weekend, the message from growers is simple: If you wait too long, you may lose out.

“Keep an eye on your source and as soon as they get (apples), better get what you need because they will go fast,” said Alan Spiniken, owner of Eagle View Farms near Suttons Bay, where a crew of migrant workers began stripping trees of a variety called “Early Gold” this week.

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
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Nip great aunt's nosiness

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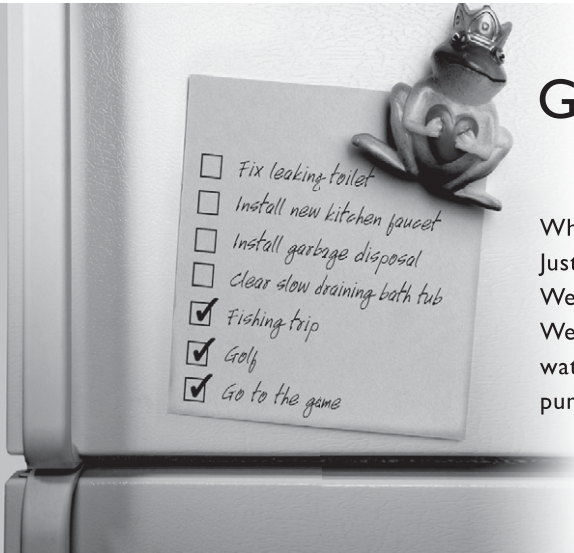
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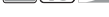

What exactly is intellectual property?

Intellectual property is a word used to describe trade secrets, patents, trademarks and copyrights. Protecting your intellectual property is an important part of your business, particularly if you expect to trademark your business's name, symbol, etc., or if your business is an invention or involves writing and producing original written works, music or videos. If you have a great idea, invention or trade secret, you need to protect it. You should be familiar with steps involved in filing for patents, trademarks or copyrights. You can also safeguard your intellectual properties by having employees or vendors sign non-disclosure agreements.

Unfortunately, intellectual property has focused the attention of organized crime. Today, piracy, counterfeiting and the theft of intellectual property pose a serious threat to all U.S. businesses. According to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Small Business Nation, the cost of such theft is estimated to be \$250 billion and affects 750,000 jobs per year. These threats to ongoing invention and innovation make it important to consider intellectual property protection, whether you are an international firm or a sole-proprietor home based business.

While every IP-based business is vulnerable to piracy and counterfeiting, small businesses can be at a particular disadvantage because they often lack resources and expertise available to larger corporations. Small businesses may also often lack familiarity with the process of protecting intellectual property: research conducted by the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO) indicates that only 15 percent of small businesses that do business overseas know that a U.S. patent or trademark provides protection only in the United States.

It has never been more essential to consider patenting your idea or registering your name as a trademark, especially if you are a small business owner or are starting a small business. Whether to file for IP protection is a decision only you can make, and involves cost/benefit analysis and other business considerations.

If you decide IP protection is right for you, whether filing in the United States or overseas, the best time to apply is before the product is brought to market. Specifically, it may be important to file for patent protection prior to publication.

A business's product or service may be eligible for more than one type of IP protection. For example, the company name could be protected by trademark, its product patented, and its promotional materials protected by copyright. Decide which protections are right for your business needs.

In the United States, patent and trademark applications are filed with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office. The U.S. Copyright Office handles copyright registration.

Much of today's intellectual property theft occurs on-line, so monitor the Internet for potential counterfeiting in addition to your marketplace monitoring. You also may wish to subscribe to trade journals to learn more about foreign markets or industry sectors being exploited by intellectual property thieves.

Museum presents ‘Evenings at the Longhouse’ talk series

HARBOR SPRINGS — The seventh event of the “Evenings at the Longhouse” summer series, presented by the Andrew J. Blackbird Museum on Tuesday, Aug. 21, will feature Frank Ettawageshik, who will be speaking on “Traditional Woodland Indian Pottery.” Ettawageshik uses the same ancient methods his ancestors used centuries ago and has thoroughly researched and perfected this unique art form. He will relate to the longhouse visitors the complete process from the gathering of the raw materials to the finished pot.

Clay pottery has been part of the Great Lakes area for more than 3,000 years. The pots were utilized for cooking and storage and also for ceremonial uses. Although Ettawageshik does not copy ancient pots and was not taught directly by an elder, his intense study and research allows him to incorporate old patterns and techniques into new and original designs.

Ettawageshik says of his art: “Making traditional Woodland Indian pottery is exciting for me because I enjoy working with clay and other materials from the earth. I feel privileged to be able to pass on and perpetuate a part of my cultural heritage. Pottery making is one of the most basic of all human industries. It has been a part of the cultural development of nearly all peoples on Earth. I feel in touch with not only my Indian heri-

tage but all human heritage when I form and fire these hand-built vessels.”

Ettawageshik lives in Harbor Springs with his wife, Rochelle. He has four adult children and four grandchildren. He is a traditional storyteller and potter, believing native people need to be rooted in traditions to be prepared for the future. He served in tribal elected office for 16 years, 14 as the Tribal Chairman of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. He now serves as the executive director of the United Tribes of Michigan. Ettawageshik’s 40 years of public service have included serving on the executive board of National Congress of American Indians, the Historical Society of Michigan Board, the Chip-

pewa Ottawa Resource Authority, the Michigan Indian Education Council, the Michigan Climate Action Council, the Little Traverse Conservancy, the Michigan Travel Commission, the Public Interest Advisory Group for the International Joint Commission’s Upper Great Lakes Study, the Michigan Great Lakes Offshore Wind Council, and the Michigan Ground Water Conservation Advisory Council.

The Longhouse is located just west of the lower parking lot by the Ottawa Stadium in Harbor Springs. Events begin at 7 p.m. Bring a lawn chair or blanket. Romney's pledge to restore Medicare cuts could backfire

WASHINGTON — GOP presidential candidate Mitt Romney's new promise to restore the Medicare cuts made by President Barack Obama's health care overhaul law could backfire if he's elected.

The reason: Obama's cuts also extended the life of Medicare's giant trust fund, and by repealing them Romney would move the insolvency date of the program closer, toward the end of what would be his first term in office.

Instead of running out of money in 2024, Medicare says its trust fund for inpatient care would go broke in 2016 without the cuts. That could leave a President Romney little political breathing room to finalize his own Medicare plan.

The Romney campaign says there's no problem with the candidate's pledge. "The idea that restoring funding to Medicare could somehow hasten its bankruptcy is on its face absurd," said spokeswoman Andrea Saul.

Campaign officials say arcane federal accounting rules create a false sense of security about Medicare. They allow savings like Obama's cuts to also count toward funding other pro-

grams or reducing the overall deficit.

"Gov. Romney's plan is to repeal Obamacare and replace it with patient-centered reforms that control cost throughout the health care system and extend the solvency of Medicare," Saul said.

"He will then implement real entitlement reform that places Medicare on a sustainable long-term footing so that future generations of Americans will not have to worry whether the program will be there for them."

But Obama's cuts were not directly aimed at Medicare's 48 million beneficiaries; instead they affect hospitals, insurers, nursing homes, drug companies and other service providers.

Simply undoing the cuts would restore higher payments to those service providers. And that would cause Medicare to spend money faster.

Romney's running mate, Wisconsin Rep. Paul Ryan, kept the Obama cuts in his budget, which envisions

greater savings by shifting future retirees into private insurance plans with a fixed payment from the government to help cover their premiums.

"If you are going to restore (Obama's cuts), then what it's going to do is complicate the financial condition of Medicare," said former U.S. Comptroller General David Walker, a fiscal conservative who says government health care programs are too costly.

"It's going to affect your long-term plan to reform Medicare and reduce the deficit and mounting debt burdens," said Walker, now heading the Comeback America Initiative, which promotes deficit reduction.

"If you are going to put that back, then how are you going to pay for it?" he asked.

Romney would "have to find other ways to get the cost down in the future," said economist Marilyn Moon, a former trustee overseeing Social Security and Medicare finances.

"These (Obama cuts) were all on service providers," said Moon, now director of the health program

at the nonpartisan American Institutes for Research. Romney "would have three options: either cut it out of providers in a different way, ask beneficiaries to pay higher premiums in various ways, or raise taxes in order to pay for it."

Romney made his promise to restore the cuts on Tuesday at a campaign stop in Beallsville, Ohio.

Obama "has taken \$716 billion out of the Medicare trust fund," Romney told supporters. "He's raided that trust fund."

"And you know what he did with it? He used it to pay for Obamacare, a risky, unproven, federal takeover of health care," Romney continued. "And if I'm pres-

ident of the United States, we're putting the \$716 billion back."

That figure reflects the latest estimates of Obama's health care law by the Congressional Budget Office, covering a 10-year period from 2013-2022.

It's a relatively modest share of total Medicare spending, currently about a \$600 billion-a-year program.

"People need to look at what these spending reductions are before they

conclude that they are really eager to undo them," said Paul Van de Water, a senior budget analyst with the liberal Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

"Why should Medicare beneficiaries want to pay more to providers to provide the same benefits?"

Despite its long-term financial problems, Medicare has been fairly stable since the passage of Obama's health care law.

Premiums have remained about the same, reflecting a national slowdown in medical inflation. However, the brunt of the spending cuts has yet to be felt. Medicare's own economic forecasters have warned the cuts may prove politically unsustainable.

Romney has not spelled out full details of his Medicare plan. But if it is based upon Ryan's, the budget office says it would rein in Medicare spending more forcefully than Obama has.



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United Airlines loses girl on solo trip to camp

10-year-old was to fly to Traverse City

NEW YORK (AP) — Should you let your child fly alone?

Parents may wonder after a couple alleged this week that their 10-year-old daughter flying to summer camp was stranded at one of the world's busiest airports after United Airlines failed to keep track of her.

The girl ultimately made it to camp safely. But the incident highlights some of the risks of children flying alone, including the a little-known industry practice of hiring outside companies to escort kids from gate to gate.

Phoebe Klebahn was flying as an "unaccompanied minor" from San Francisco to Traverse City, Mich. with a connection in Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. The girl's parents, Annie and Perry Klebahn, had paid United an extra \$99 to assist her during the June 30 trip.

When the first flight landed in Chicago, the company United hired apparently failed to show up.

The parents claim in a letter sent to the airline that their daughter asked for help, including the use of a cell phone, but was repeatedly told to wait by flight attendants. And it

appears no one from the airline called the camp after the girl missed her connecting flight.

"She was sad and scared and no one helped," the parents wrote. They shared the letter with media though a family friend who is a business management professor.

The parents did not respond to calls seeking an interview.

The Klebahns wrote that it took them nearly an hour of frantic phone calls to get an answer from United once the camp informed them their daughter hadn't arrived at the Traverse City airport.

United, part of United Continental Holdings Inc., refused to identify the company that was supposed to look after the girl. It also declined to say if she was ever unsupervised or explain why it took so long to tell the parents where she was.

Flight attendants typically wait with children until the contractor arrives.

In a statement, the airline said it reached out to the Klebahns to apologize and is reviewing the situation. United has refunded the \$99 fee and returned the frequent flier miles the family used for the flight.

Parents who need to send

their kids traveling alone shouldn't fret. Hundreds of thousands of kids fly on their own each year — about 160,000 on Delta alone — although the government doesn't keep detailed data. And while there are occasional mishaps — which would petrify any parent — experts say they represent a small minority of overall trips.

"In general, it is safe. You just have to be really smart about it," said Anne Banas, executive editor of advice site SmarterTravel.com.

First off, reservations are made the old-fashioned way: by calling an airline or travel agent directly. Airlines should waive any additional phone reservation fees. You'll be charged between \$25 and \$100 each way for the minor in addition to airfare. When two or more children travel together, most airlines charge a single fee. And kids flying solo usually get to check their first and second bags for free.

The fee for unaccompanied minors buys a flight attendant escort on the plane and between flights, but not constant supervision. Children will likely spend some time alone, either on the plane or in an airport room away from other passengers, especially when extended layovers

or delays are involved.

And while some airlines will hand off minors to other companies — usually the same ones to assist passengers in wheelchairs — not everybody follows that practice. For instance, Southwest Airlines only uses its own employees, according to spokesman Chris Mainz. Delta tries to have its own staff escort kids but spokesman Morgan Durrant notes that contractors might be used on peak days.

Delta has also set up specially supervised rooms in most of its major airports called the SkyZone — a mini-lounge for kids with snacks, beverages, video games and books.

Parents should book a nonstop flight whenever possible to minimize delays. If you must connect, avoid using two different airlines. Also choose an early flight — those are less prone to delays than later flights.

Before heading to the airport, make sure the minor has packed the following things:

- Paperwork. Kids

should have a copy of their itineraries and birth certificates in their bags. The itinerary should include travel dates, flight numbers, departure and arrival times and the reservation's record locator number. You should also include the parents' or guardians' home, work and cell phone numbers.

- Snacks and cash for food. Most airlines will give children traveling alone snacks onboard like chips or cheese-and-crackers for free. But long delays can lead to growling stomachs, so give your child some traveling money. Throw in some gum to ease popping ears.
- Entertainment. Books, small toys and electronics like DVD players and iPods are great to bring onboard, especially on longer flights. Be sure to forewarn your child that they'll have to turn off electronic gadgets during takeoff and landing.
- A day's worth of essentials. Pack a change of clothes in your child's carry-on, in case a checked bag gets lost, along with a

light sweater or sweat shirt for chilly planes.

- A cell phone or calling card. Kids will be more at ease — and parents will be too — when everyone stays in touch.

Get to the airport up to two hours early for drop-off. Parents have to fill out paperwork and get a gate pass to go through security. The adult picking up the child should also arrive early — by at least an hour — to fill out their share of paperwork.

Unaccompanied minors usually board first. Notifying the airline staff at the gate gives them time to find a crew member to walk the child to a seat on board. And don't leave until the flight has taken off. Flights can be cancelled hours after they've taxied from the gate.

Finally, when picking up at the airport, don't worry if you don't see the child right away. They're often the last ones off. A flight attendant will check the identification of the receiving adult, get a signature and you'll be on your way.

Worker rights backers sue for ballot spot

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Backers of a plan to enshrine collective bargaining rights in the Michigan Constitution have asked courts to intervene after an election board refused to place it on the November ballot.

The Board of State Canvassers deadlocked 2-2 Wednesday on the proposal. Sponsors of the Protect Our Jobs plan then asked the state Court of Appeals or state Supreme Court to intervene.

There was no immediate court action.

The canvassers did certify petitions for ballot initiatives involving renewable energy and in-home care providers.

The energy measure mandates 25 percent of Michigan energy come from renewable sources by 2025.

The other measure would make training, regulation and union rights available to home health care workers.

A proposal calling for expanded casino gambling was pulled Tuesday after the appeals court ruled it unconstitutional.

State Senate designates Michigan Patriot Week for Sept. 11-17

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — The Michigan Senate has adopted a resolution designating Sept. 11-17 Michigan Patriot Week.

The measure approved unanimously Wednesday is intended to recognize the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks as well as the signing of the U.S. Constitution on Sept. 17, 1787.

The resolution says U.S. "citizens must take time to honor the First Principles, founders, documents and symbols of their history."

Lawmakers urge residents, communities, schools and nonprofit organizations to recognize the week and participate in some way.

When asked about what the board planned to do about improving the cost, which has already been spent, Emmet chairman Jim Tamlyn suggested the building and grounds committee's instructions to acquire the dome were "in black and white."

But, Tamlyn also acknowledged that it is the board's policy to hold a roll call vote on financial expenditures more than \$5,000.

"We should have put a number like 'up to \$20,000' on it," Tamlyn said.

Emmet County commissioner Dan Plasencia, chairman of the Emmet Finance Committee, said "it didn't come out in the minutes like we had discussed."

Tamlyn said the full board should have approved the amount. However, he added that the fast timeline for removing the dome from Cranbrook's property required the county staff to act quickly.

Now that it is here, the question remains for the board what it wants to do with an observatory dome and what structure it might go on in the future.

Both men said project cost would be paid and didn't require the board to revisit the topic.

The next question is how will Emmet County use its observatory dome?

The 10-foot metal dome was previously installed at the institute in 1978 to shield large telescopes, but was removed

after a new dome was installed earlier this month.

"We were sort of at an indecision about what to do with the old observatory," said Mike Narlock, head of astronomy at Cranbrook Institute of Science in Bloomfield Hills.

Narlock said a meeting between the director at Cranbrook and Emmet County officials brought up the possibility of the county taking the dome.

A new dome, Narlock estimates, could cost between \$50,000 to \$60,000. Emmet County paid more than \$9,000 to pay for dismantling and trailering of the dome to its current location at a hangar in Pellston Regional Airport.

Last month, Emmet County controller Lyn Johnson told the News-Review a small building was being considered near Central Avenue outside the Headlands, but that plans were in the very early and conceptual stages.

Observatories tend to house large telescopes ranging in price from several thousand dollars to \$100,000. There has been no discussion publicly about whether the county is seeking telescope donations or considering purchasing one in the future.

"Whenever you build an observatory, you want to put a sizable telescope in it," Narlock said, "Otherwise there is no reason for it."

The observatory will also require a considerable amount of refurbishment, after being

According to Emmet County Board of Commissioner's "Rules of Procedure," a roll call vote is required for the expenditure of money. The board has the ability to suspend the rules by a two-thirds majority vote, but no such votes too place last month.

Court rejects Democratic challenge to labor laws

LANSING (AP) — The Michigan Court of Appeals has sided with House Republicans in a procedural dispute with minority Democrats over when two pieces of labor legislation take effect.

On March 30, an Ingham County judge issued the order aimed at ensuring Republicans follow certain procedures when granting what is called "immediate effect" to bills approved by lawmakers.

That status determines how quickly a new law kicks in once signed by the governor.

The state Court of Appeals froze the decision in April, then issued an order Thursday reversing the lower court's decision.

The appeals court ruling affects Republican-passed measures to ban unionization of graduate student research assistants at public universities, and to ban public schools from deducting union dues from employee paychecks.

en to it and it is capped with a roof. But closed landfills still need maintenance, said Ozoga.

A control panel monitors conditions within the landfill. The landfill requires monitoring because the garbage in them decomposes, releasing gas. Water from years of rain and snow trickles down through the garbage, picking up sediment and forming leachate. The control panels monitor not only how much

methane the garbage's decomposition is releasing, but how much water sits at the bottom of the landfill as well.

In an active landfill, as much as 30,000 gallons of water is siphoned off every day, said Ozoga.

"It costs \$300,000-400,000 just to manage water at a landfill every year," said Ozoga. "A whole tanker truck holds 10,000 gallons of water, and three of those leave a landfill every day."

Depending on where the water came from within the dump, and where the landfill is located, the water is either evaporated, cycled through a wastewater treatment plant or pumped into injection wells.

The gas, too, can be used, though much of it is just burned off at site. A landfill in Harrison uses the methane gas to generate electricity in a power cell. The cell generates as much electricity as the two windmills near Mackinaw

City, said Ozoga, and is sent to the grid.

"Landfills are not boring," said Ozoga. "People have no idea — they're not just a dump. They're high tech."

The landfill in Eveline Township, which is inspected annually, has until Sept. 3 to right the violations, and will be required to provide the last three months of leachate collection system records.

Immediate future for Vanderbilt casino remains unclear

VANDERBILT — It is not immediately known what the outcome will be for the shuttered Bay Mills Vanderbilt Casino now that the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit vacated the injunction against the casino Wednesday.

A Wednesday news release from Shannon Jones, Bay Mills Indian Community spokesperson, stated the appeals court had ruled in favor of the tribe, "vacating the injunction on the Vanderbilt Casino as of Aug. 15."

"We have no further comment at this time. If anything comes up I will let you know," Jones added in a Thursday email to the Gaylord Herald Times.

Elizabeth Haus, Vanderbilt village clerk and former president said she and current village president Ed Posgate were in conversation with Bay Mills tribal leaders once the 12-page opinion by court appeals judge Raymond Kethledge was released Wednesday. The ruling, in effect, opens the door for the casino to reopen.

"They are trying to work with the state to resolve this through the courts," Haus said. "They said their next

step is to proceed through the proper legal channels. It is the first step and is a good first step."

The legal opinion, in effect, overturns a March 2011 injunction by federal judge Paul L. Maloney, who had ruled in favor of an injunction filed by the state and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians to have the Vanderbilt

casino closed while the legality of its operations worked its way through the courts.

Joy Yearout, spokesperson for the state attorney general's office, issued a statement Thursday in response to the appeals court ruling.

"We disagree with the decision issued by the 6th circuit and our team is reviewing our options, including whether to

appeal," she said. "This is not the end of the road. Attorney General (Bill) Schuette will pursue all available avenues to prevent Bay Mills from engaging in illegal off-reservation gambling operations."

The two sides have been embroiled in a legal battle since shortly after Bay Mills opened an 84 slot machine gaming operation just north of Vanderbilt in November of 2010.

The casino was ordered shut down in March 2011, just five months after opening, when the federal court of appeals denied a motion by Bay Mills to remain open while the legality of its operations in Vanderbilt worked its way through the courts.

Less than a month after the casino opened, the attorney general's office and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians challenged the legality of the casino in a lawsuit.

According to Jones, the most recent court action "found that it (court) lacked jurisdiction over certain claims being made by the State of Michigan and Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, plaintiffs in the case. In particular, the court found that all of Little Traverse's causes of actions have been 'knocked out.'"

On Thursday James Nye,

spokesperson for the Odawa and four other tribes named in the lawsuit against Bay Mills, said he and tribal leaders were still reading through Kethledge's 12 page opinion to determine its implications regarding the ongoing legal battle against Bay Mills.

"We haven't had time to focus on it at this time and are not ready to comment," he said.

The shuttered casino is located at the former site of the visitor information center that had been owned by Tree-tops Resort at the north village limits of Vanderbilt.

Bay Mills purchased the property in 2010 just prior to renovating the building and opening it for use as a casino.

Since it opened in November of 2010, Bay Mills leaders have maintained the casino was operating on Indian land because the property had been purchased with money from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act.

Kurt Perron, Bay Mills Tribal Chairman said in Wednesday's news release, "The court's ruling is a step in the right direction. Though many issues must still be resolved in this litigation, we ultimately look forward to affirming the tribe's rights."

Looking to save on prescriptions? It's complicated

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Struggling to pay for your prescription medication?

You're far from alone: Studies show roughly a quarter of patients don't take medicines they need because they cannot afford them.

There are plenty of ways to save big on medicines, but the complexity of finding the best deal can be a huge headache.

Along with patient assistance programs, there are countless coupons and discount cards available. Prices change often and vary dramatically among pharmacies, even within the same chain, so it's often very difficult to compare all the deals.

Here are some guidelines and sources to try:

For starters, when a doctor is about to write a prescription, jump in with key questions:

—Are free samples available?

—Is the drug is generally covered by insurance plans? Sometimes very costly medicines or some brands in categories with multiple drugs are excluded.

—Is there a cheaper drug that will work as well?

—Is there a generic version?

An unprecedented number of blockbuster drugs, those with annual sales exceeding \$1 billion, have recently begun to face generic competition or will by next year. That includes cholesterol fighter Lipitor, blood thinner Plavix and four of the other 20 best-selling drugs in the world.

Many of these drugs are taken daily for years by millions of people. Once multiple generic versions hit the market, they are often priced up to 90 percent below the brand-name medicine's cost.

Assistance programs

A patient assistance program may be able to help. They generally have income limits and other eligibility rules, but some are fairly generous, particularly for newer drugs for cancer or rare diseases that can cost \$20,000 a year or more.

—Drugmakers almost always offer patients help, as their commercials note. Check out the website for the company or the drug.

—The pharmaceutical industry's Partnership for Prescription Assistance, at www.pparx.org or 1-888-4PPA NOW, directs uninsured patients to individual programs that can supply drugs for free or nearly free.

—Patient advocacy groups focused on one disease often can help patients or point them in the right direction.

—The nonprofit Patient Advocate Foundation, at www.patientadvocate.org, helps patients find copayment assistance, navigate problems with insurance and deal with medical debt and related problems.

Also, many government-subsidized health clinics provide prescriptions for free or at a discount based on the patient's income.

Retailers and online pharmacies

If you don't qualify for help, here are some other ways to save:

—Several national discount stores, including Target, Kmart and Walmart, as well as large grocery chains, offer hundreds of widely used generic drugs for just \$4 to \$10 a month. They're hoping shoppers will also buy other merchandise.

—If you're insured, don't assume your prescription plan offers the best price. Some high-volume discounters, such as Costco, offer great deals for cash-paying customers, particularly on generic drugs.

—Prescription coupons from the makers of brand-name drugs typically offer a first prescription free, or \$50 to \$100 off for anywhere from a few months to a couple years.

Some are only for patients with insurance, and can reduce copayments to as little as \$4; others offer the same discounts to anyone paying cash. But coupons cannot be used with Medicare, Medicaid or other government insurance.

—Check out Internet pharmacies, particularly www.HealthWarehouse.com. A report last year by Consumer Reports on the big differences in prices among pharmacies noted a limited survey found the best online prices at that site.

HealthWarehouse holds costs down by getting volume discounts directly from manufacturers. It sells about 3,500 drugs for people as well as pets, including refrigerated medicines. On the third Friday of each month — this Friday — it offers a free prescription worth up to \$500 to new customers or patients submitting a new prescription.

If you're shopping online, avoid sites that don't require a prescription. That's illegal and they likely to be selling potentially dangerous counterfeit drugs.

Stick with sites with a blue-and-red Verified Internet Pharmacy Practice Sites seal. They have been checked out by an association of state boards that license U.S. and Canadian pharmacies. The group lists approved Internet pharmacies at www.nabp.net/programs/accreditation/vipps/find-a-vipps-online-pharmacy.

Discount cards

Scores of discount cards are available online, generally for free. Most are good for a variety of medicines, including generic drugs, at tens of thousands of U.S. pharmacies. But each card could offer a huge discount on one drug and only a couple dollars or nothing at all off another.

The pharmacies provide discounts so they'll remain competitive, particularly with cards offered by huge groups such as AARP and AAA. The prices generally are negotiated by third parties such as prescription benefit managers that already work with a huge network of pharmacies, according to consumer advocate Edgar Dworsky.

"Different stores, different cards, different drugs all yield different prices," sometimes varying by 100 percent or more, noted Dworsky, who runs the site www.ConsumerWorld.org.

He just completed a survey, at www.consumerworld.org/pubs/prescriptiondrugcardsprsr.pdf, showing how difficult it can be to compare prices using different discount cards for specific drugs. Most pharmacists won't do multiple price lookups because their automated systems usually require them to first enter all the doctor, patient and medication information and sometimes charges them for each lookup. So first promise you will fill the prescription, Dworsky said.

He generally found that paying cash at Costco was cheaper than using a discount card. That's partly because the operation sponsoring each discount card, the company organizing the pharmacy network and the individual pharmacy each take a small transaction fee.

—One of the cards with the best prices, according to Dworsky, is at www.needymeds.org.

Its president, Dr. Richard Sagall, said the site's discount card has average savings of 45 percent to 50 per-

cent and also covers some pet and nonprescription medicines.

The site also has links to more than 1,000 discount coupons, scholarships and camps for children and adults with a particular disease, more than 10,000 clinics providing medical care for free or low cost, and other help.

Sagall notes that unlike other discount cards, his site's card doesn't require people to provide personal information that can be used for marketing purposes. The site even has a link to download a free book on how to save on prescription medicines.

Comparison shop

Given the huge variation in prices with different programs, do as much comparison shopping as possible.

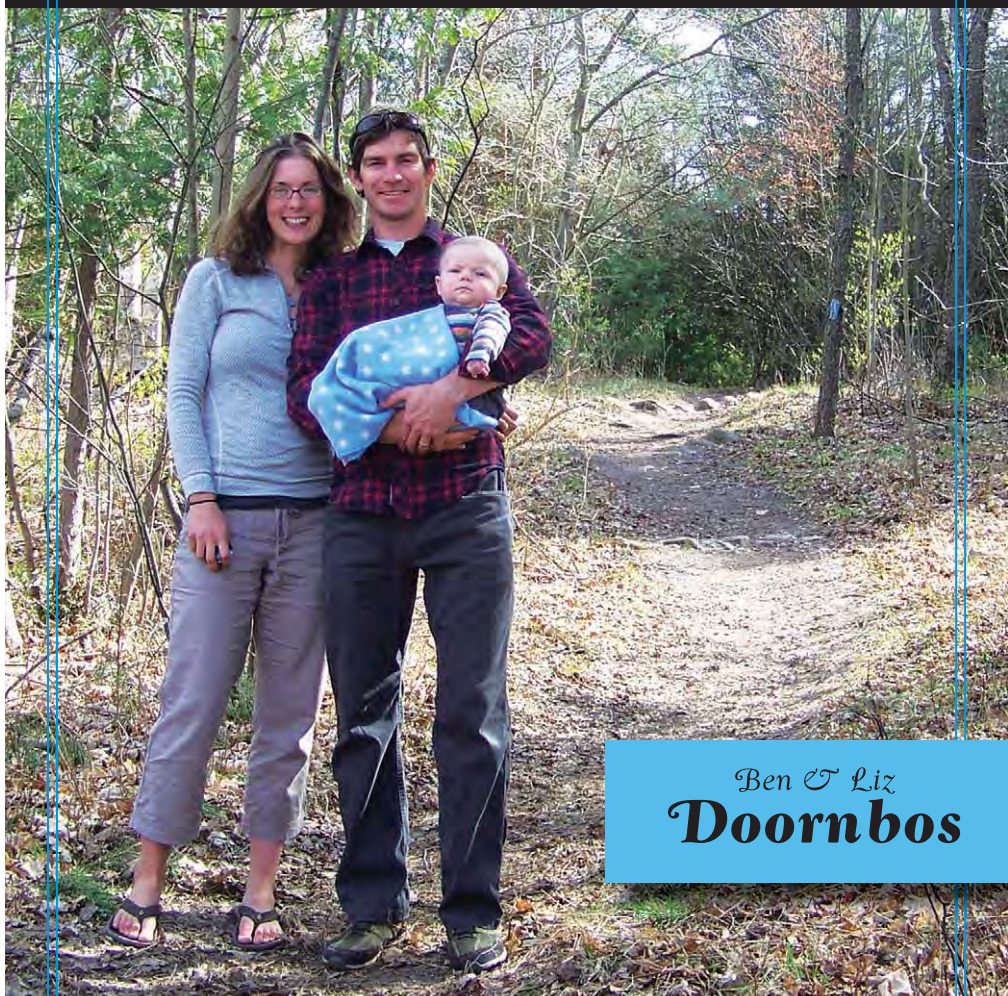
Some state health departments run websites that enable residents to comparison shop at pharmacies in their area, but they may not include information on manufacturer coupons or available discount cards.

Another option is www.goodrx.com, which also has an iPhone application. After you enter your drug name and zip code, it lists prices at numerous area pharmacies, along with printable coupons needed to get those prices.

Once you've found the best deals for your medicines, don't assume you're set for good. If prices for your drugs rise down the road, do your homework again.

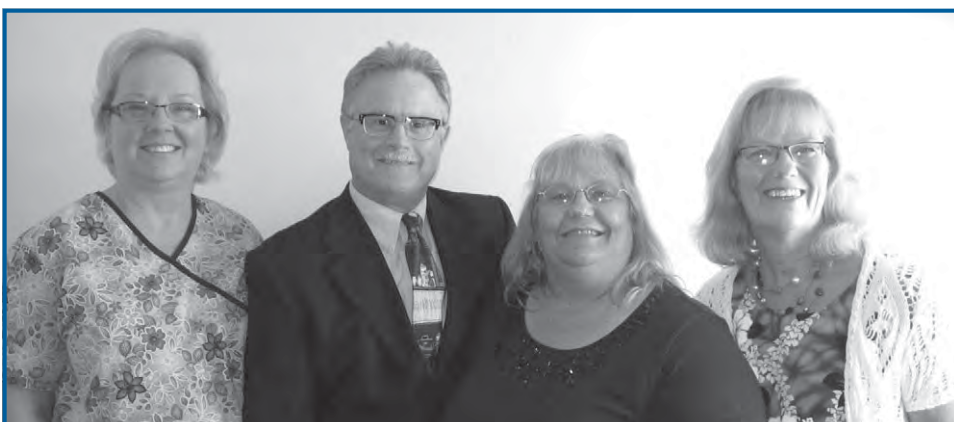

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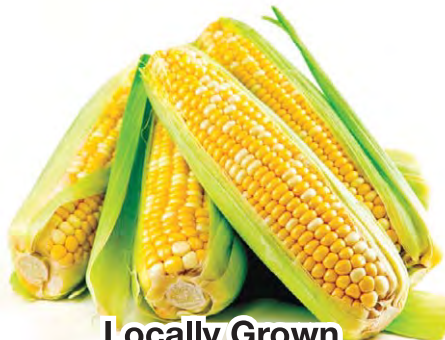

Scott Hebert of Grand Traverse Resort, who has won five of the last PGA Championships, is the defending champion.

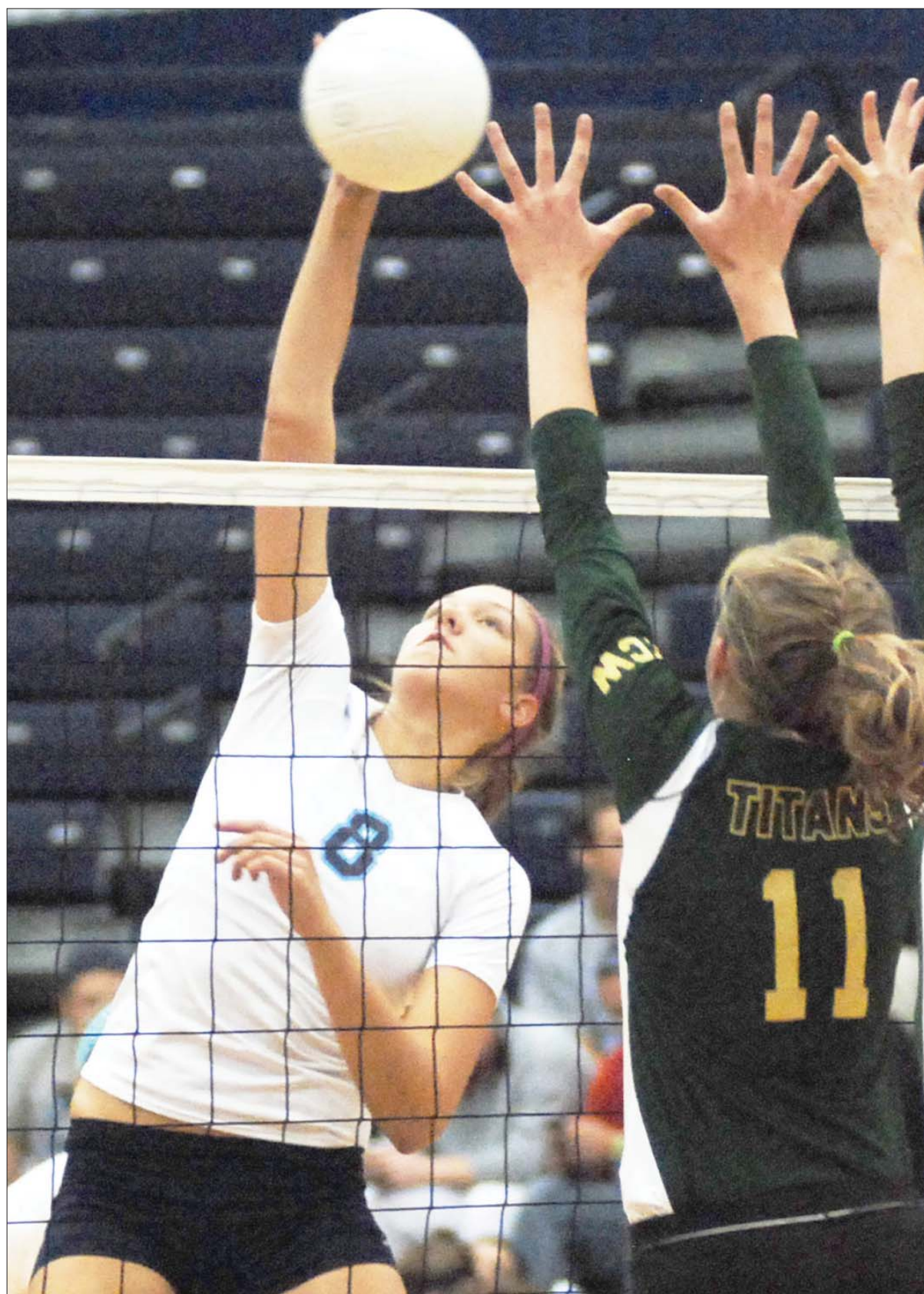
The field will be cut to the low 70s and ties after Tuesday's second round.

On Sept. 5, the Cowboys visit the Giants to open the season. Not since 2001 has the NFL played games that count in the standings with replacement officials, and that was for one week. This lockout began June 3.

The 19-year-old Thomas won 1 up in the match-play contest against the top-seeded Wyatt, who equaled a tournament record in stroke-play qualifying by shooting 9-under 132.

Thomas will face Australian Oliver Goss, a 2-and-1 winner over Bobby Leopold of Cranston, R.I.

Also advancing on Thursday were Chris Williams of Moscow, Idaho, who is first in the world amateur rankings; Steven Fox of Hendersonville, Tenn.; Cheng-Tsung Pan of Taiwan, who plays at the University of Washington; Brandon Hagy of Westlake Village, Calif.; Richard Gouveia of Portugal; Michael Weaver of Fresno, Calif.

Saginaw alum Woodley donates \$60,000 for athletics

Pittsburgh Steelers linebacker LaMarr Woodley heard that his high school alma mater needed to charge participation fees for its athletes due to budget cuts.

So he decided to pick up the bill — for the entire school district.

Woodley donated \$60,000 to cover the participation fees for every Saginaw Public Schools student-athlete, an act that was met with a thunderous ovation when announced to coaches on Tuesday night.

"The whole place erupted," Saginaw High athletic director Dan Szatkowski said. "It was electric. It was a gold-medal cheer."

Woodley, a 2009 Pro Bowler, starred at Saginaw High before playing for Michigan. He was a second-round pick of the Steelers in 2007.

Woodley's donation covers the participation costs of middle school, junior high and high school athletes in Saginaw, each of whom were affected when the district's athletic department budget was cut.

Participation fees for athletes in high school, for example, were \$75 per school year.

returns after serving at 98.3 percent last season. She missed just five serves all of last year, and finished with 379 digs, 140 kills and was 89 percent on serve reception.

“Alyssa is really steady,” Miller said. “She doesn’t make a lot of errors and like (Ance), she does every skill well. She’s been hitting well from the outside, she has a great serve, she can set, and she’s just a good all-around athlete.”

Senior Shannon Cosens returns as the setter.

“She knows her hitters and she knows where they like the ball,” Miller said. “We have some good firepower at the net and getting them the ball will be key.”

Also back are Liz Fraser, who Miller said has come on strong as an outside hitter, and defensive specialist Becca Rash.

A quartet of juniors — Tori Visconti, Natalie Weaver, Katie Gilpatrick and Jayme Larson — are up from the JV.

“The girls all have high expectations for themselves as do I,” Miller said. “They feel like they should be a contender in the Big North Conference this year, although our league will be a battle

night-in, night-out.

Boyne City

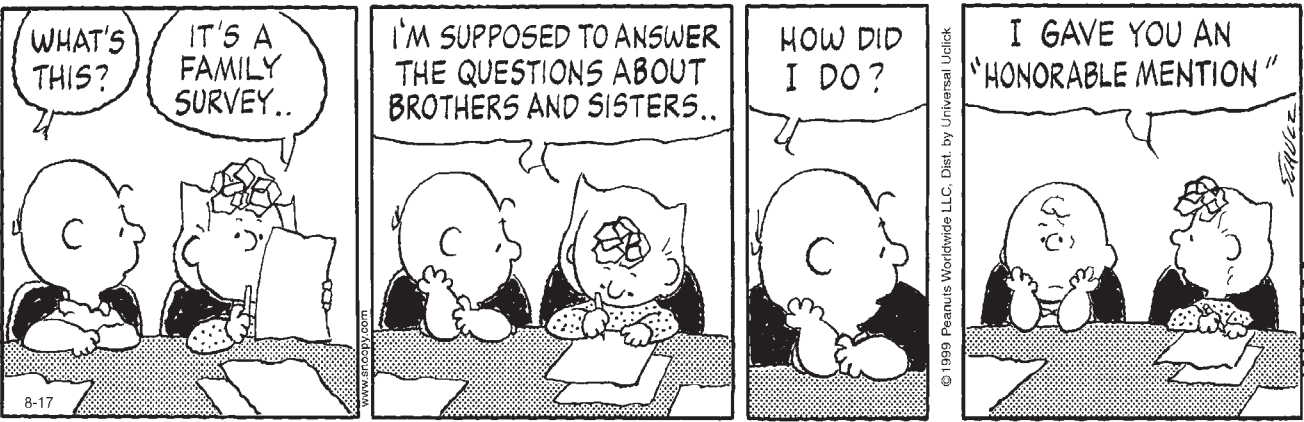

Lions face revamped Baltimore defense

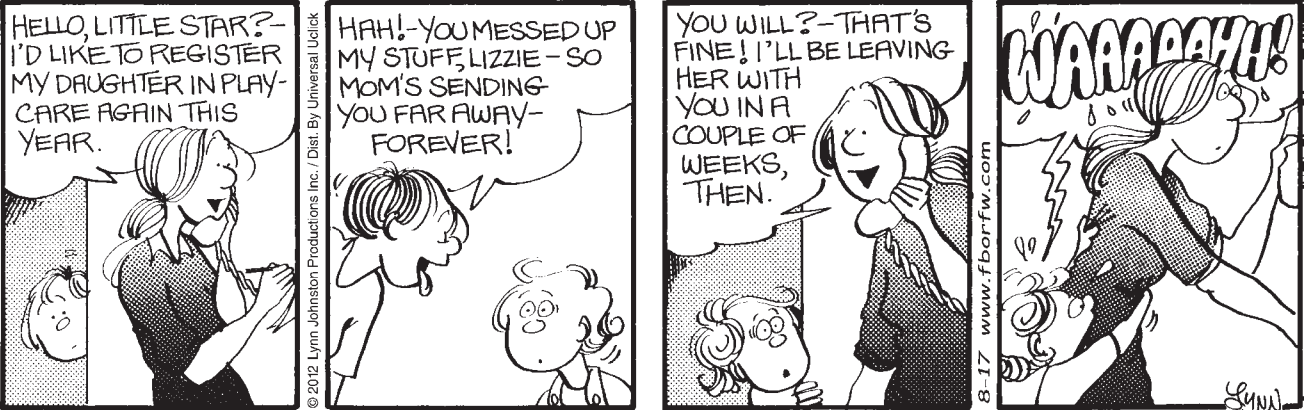
BALTIMORE (AP) — In his first game as defensive coordinator of the Baltimore Ravens, Dean Pees watched Atlanta Falcons quarterback Matt Ryan follow the opening kickoff with five straight completions for 71 yards and a touchdown. Not exactly what Pees was looking for from a unit that has exuded excellence for well over a decade. The revamped Ravens’ defense will attempt to improve that shortcoming Friday night against the Detroit Lions (No. 11 tie in the AP Pro32), whose first-team offense sputtered last Friday in the preseason opener against Cleveland. On its opening series, the Lions went three-and-out. Matthew Stafford threw an interception to end the second possession. After seven plays and a punt on the third series, Stafford and the rest of the first unit took a seat to try to figure out what went wrong. Against the Ravens (No. 5), Detroit has a second chance to make things right. “Hopefully, we play a lot better. We need to play a lot better,” coach Jim Schwartz said. “We need to play with a little more sense of urgency.” Even if the final outcome doesn’t mean a darn thing. “When you face a force like the Ravens, it’s exciting

if you have an ounce of competitive nature,” said Lions wide receiver Nate Burleson, who was held without a catch against Cleveland. “You have to say, this game doesn’t count, but we’re still trying to score and we’re preparing for it as if it is a real game. The Ravens are going to try to bang us and try to force fumbles and interceptions. I think this preseason game will have a regular-season type atmosphere.” The Ravens are intent upon stuffing Stafford and the Detroit offense. Burleson and the Lions have no intention of letting that happen. “We want to score early and often,” Burleson said. “We don’t want to sound cocky, but our standard is that we expect to score every time we have the ball. For us not to score against Cleveland, it kind of burned a little bit. It took us some time to calm down and get ready for our next opportunity.” The Ravens will be tested by a Detroit defense working on building a reputation. “They are just a real physical, talented football team,”

For the last 10 years, Petoskey's Festival on the Bay has celebrated all the waterfront community has to offer.

With live music, family events, corporate challenges and a million dollar sunset, the 10th annual festival runs today, Friday, Aug. 17 to Sunday, Aug. 19.

‘Come on Baby Light My Fire’

Inspired by music, Petoskey fabric and textiles artist Mary Lee Huber will have her quilt “Come on Baby Light My Fire” judged as part of the 2012 American Quilter’s Society’s Quilt Show, which runs Wednesday-Saturday, Aug. 22-25 in Grand Rapids.

Huber’s quilt will be displayed, along with 357 others in the first year of the contest, with judges awarding the top three prizes in five categories.

“My mother introduced me to traditional quilting, but it really wasn’t all that interesting to me because I wanted to create things,” Huber said.

Now, Huber focuses on art

quilting, which she said results with the finished product looking like an abstract or realism painting. She also does landscape quilts.

Huber’s quilt, a wall hanging, comes from the song, “Light My Fire” by The Doors.

It shows a woman, surrounded by fire, holding a matchstick in her hand, with small pieces of flames around her.

“The border around it shows international doors — doors from several different countries,” Huber explained.

Diane Simancek of Bellaire put the layers of the quilt together.

Huber recently learned that her quilt was also accepted into an American Quilter’s Society show in Des Moines, Iowa, which is in October. If her piece is chosen as the winner in Grand Rapids, she won’t be able to enter it in Des Moines. Huber’s work will also be featured in upcoming

BEAVER ISLAND

Art students explore print-making, magic tricks

Students in Crooked Tree Arts Center’s 21st Century Arts program on Beaver Island have worked with two artisans this summer as part of the Crooked Tree Arts Center’s summer offerings at their school. Earlier in the summer, the students did a series of print making classes with Sara Mullen, a Rockford art teacher. Mullen, a summer resident on the island, brings some of her classroom lessons to share with the Beaver Island students.

Mullen described the summer lessons: “The students started simple, designing and making a monoprint. Then they learned what a lithograph was and moved on to creating lithographs of favorite images of Beaver Island. Some of the images included the ferry, historic buildings, as well as current businesses and landmarks that are meaningful to the students. I like to bring something new to the Beaver Island kids that builds on things they’ve learned about and tried — like going from a monoprint to a lithograph.”

The other artisan that visited the island brought a form of performance art to the students. Jania Taylor, a Harbor Springs magician, performed a magic show for the students.

“Having a magic performance with a theme is a good way to get important information across to the students. Taylor’s show, The Magic of Reading shared with students, in an entertaining way, the benefits of reading books, information about types of books, and the idea that you can learn about things like magic from books,” commented Marty Samson, 21st Century Arts coordinator at Crooked Tree Arts Center.

“That the information is shared through magic makes it more memorable. And as an

added bonus it’s really fun for the kids.”

After the performance, the students attended a magic workshop where they learned some simple magic tricks.

“Learning and doing magic helps build fine motor skill and coordination. It builds self confidence as they work on performing tricks for an audience. It also builds a child’s self esteem. When they master a trick, they know something other people don’t. They can do something unique that leaves an impression on other people.”

It's a thick-skinned vegetable that when peeled, reveals a dense round mass, similar to that of a radish, but bigger like a cabbage.

Kohlrabi is a member of the brassica family, a nutrient-dense group that includes other vegetables such as cabbage, kale, broccoli and Brussels sprouts.

Kohlrabi can come in green or purple varieties, which have similar flavors. The greens often come attached, and can also be cooked much like turnip or beet greens.

After peeling the hard, fibrous layer, kohlrabi can be cooked in a variety of ways, or served up in salads and eaten raw.

Kohlrabi soup

From Pond Hill Farm, makes 4 servings

2 tablespoons butter
1 medium onion, chopped
1 pound kohlrabi bulbs, peeled and chopped
2 1/2 cups vegetable stock
2 1/2 cups milk
1 bay leaf
salt and pepper to taste

Melt butter in a large pan with a lid. Add onions and cook until soft, about 10 minutes. Add kohlrabi and cook for another two minutes.

Add vegetable stock, milk and bay leaf to pan and bring to a boil. Cover, and reduce heat to low and simmer 25 minutes or until kohlrabi is tender. Let the soup cool a few minutes and remove bay leaf.

Using an immersion blender or conventional blender, puree the soup until smooth. Season with salt and pepper before serving.

Kohlrabi fries

1 large kohlrabi, peeled and cut into fries
2 tablespoons flour
salt, pepper, and other seasonings of your choice

Preheat oven to 425.

Mix flour, salt, pepper and spices into a shallow bowl. Add kohlrabi and toss to coat.

Grease a baking sheet, and add coated fries in a single layer.

Bake for 20-30 minutes, tossing regularly, until browned and tender.
